First South Africa G20 Presidency roadshow hosted in Limpopo

On 7 March 2025, the Department of International Relations and Cooperation, in partnership with the Limpopo Provincial Government, conducted a Group of Twenty (G20) roadshow at the University of Venda Stadium, Limpopo. The event was attended by community-based organisations, as well as representatives from traditional councils, to access first-hand information on the benefits and impact of South Africa's G20 Presidency.

According to the Deputy Minister of International Relations and Cooperation, Ms Thandi Moraka, the roadshows aimed to outline the milestones and importance of South Africa's G20 Presidency to the entire African continent. "This is a government communication programme centred on driving inclusive economic growth and job creation, as well as the priorities to reduce poverty, tackle the high cost of living and build a capable, ethical and developmental state." She continued, "The roadshow aims to acquaint and embolden the province to market its products to attract foreign investment."

The Deputy Minister also explained the key elements of the G20 Presidency, which are expected to benefit Limpopo's growing economy, and indicated that Limpopo had beautiful, natural sites that could promote overall tourism in the country. "The G20 Presidency will make all this happen and as such, create job opportunities," she said, before adding, "Limpopo is one of the places that leaves a lasting impression on anyone visiting."

This marks the first ever G20 roadshow in Africa, and forms part of a plan for the province to utilise South Africa's presidency to attract more investments. The final G20 Summit will be held in Gauteng in November 2025, whereafter, South Africa will hand over the presidency to the United States of America. Government leaders, including Limpopo Member of the Executive Council for Economic Development and Tourism, Mr Tshitereke Matibe, thanked the South African government for the opportunity to host visitors in their province.

Summit encourages youth participation in government programmes

On 6 February 2025, the Government Communication and Information System supported a youth summit held at Zithabiseni Resort in the Thembisile Hani Local Municipality (THLM). A stakeholder engagement was also conducted to raise awareness on government's Programme of Action as articulated in President Cyril Ramaphosa's State of the Nation Address (SoNA). Participants included representatives from the departments of Agriculture, Minerals and Energy, Employment and Labour, Culture, Sport and Recreation, Mpumalanga Economic Growth Agency, Sector Education and Training Authority, National Youth Development Agency, Thembisile Hani Youth Brigade, South African Association of Youth Clubs, South African Youth Council, the Congress of Traditional Leaders of South Africa and the Thembisile Hani Youth Development Forum.

"You are here as young people to deliberate on issues affecting the youth of THLM. This administration took a deliberate decision to champion five pillars of governance within the municipality, and pillar number five, which is socio-economic development, is where youth empowerment initiatives are found, and we support youth programmes practically. That is the reason

we are gathered today to engage robustly and constructively on issues and matters affecting the youth of the municipality," said Mr Dumisani Mahlangu, Municipal Manager in the THLM when conveying a message of support.

In his keynote address, Member of the Mayoral Committee for Social Services in the municipality, Cllr TJ Ntuli, said, "Young people, we are here because of you, and you must indicate to us the kind of water required to water the seed that we are planting here today, and please bear in mind that our municipality is dominated by young people. I want to urge you to consider paying for municipal services, whether employed or not, and if not, there are ways in place to ensure that it is done to make the municipality economically viable."

The session was well attended by young people and their participation in all the engagements was positive. Stakeholders shared available development opportunities in government to assist the youth, and ways to access them.

Democracy Bus touches down in Gauteng's Westrand

The Democracy Bus arrived in Gauteng, making its first stop in the Westrand District on 5 March 2025. The bus visited Kokosi township near Fochville in the Merafong City Local Municipality and Munsieville, a small township outside Krugersdorp in the Mogale City Local Municipality.

The programme in Kokosi was a precursor to the "Ke Moja (I'm fine without drugs)" campaign and service delivery outreach in Munsieville, which took place on Friday, 7 March 2025. Both events aimed to raise awareness on substance abuse, highlight government efforts to support individuals and families affected by drug and alcohol abuse and provide a platform for departments and organisations to offer services and information to the community.

At the Kokosi event, Mr Karabo Moleko, a Community Development Worker (CDW), emphasised government's achievements in the area by saying, "The housing project has restored dignity for many families who were previously disadvantaged. Over the past 30 years, our government has transformed many lives in our community. We are grateful to have the Democracy Bus here, reminding people of the government's hard work." World TB Day commemoration at Ugu District Municipality

Chairperson of the South African National AIDS Council (SANAC), Deputy President Paul Mashatile, delivered a keynote address at the 2025 World Tuberculosis (TB) Day commemoration event and launch of the National End TB Campaign at the Ugu Sports and Leisure Centre in Ugu District Municipality, KwaZulu-Natal (KZN).

"South Africa is among 30 countries that account for 87% of the global TB burden. It is also among 10 countries battling the burden of TB, Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), TB co-infection, as well as drug-resistant TB. Yet, TB is a disease that is preventable and perfectly curable, even if one is living with HIV," said the Deputy President.

He continued, "We must therefore, work much harder to change this situation. Hence, before we started the programme, we visited families that required support. We must continuously visit

families, as prevention is the foundation of primary healthcare. This is another reason we have this commemoration, which is to remind us that TB is out there and it kills; however, we hold the power to end it!"

Some of the dignitaries present at the launch included the Chairperson of the KZN Provincial House of Traditional and Khoisan Leaders, Inkosi Rubert Sifiso Shinga; Premier of KZN, Mr Thamsanqa Ntuli; Minister of Health, Dr Aaron Motsoaledi; Deputy Minister of Health, Mr Joe Paahla; KZN Member of Executive Council for Health, Ms Nomagugu Simelane-Mngadi; SA Patron of Global Alliance, Ms Humile Mashatile and SANAC Civil Society Chairperson, Mr Solly Nduku. Prior to the launch, Deputy President Mashatile led a walkabout and visited households in Gamalakhe township, where community members agreed to be screened and tested for TB as part of the commemoration.








